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Template Instructions

This template was designed to provide a starting point for municipalities within the state of Arizona to develop a reunification plan. It was developed by the City of Phoenix Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (OHSEM) with significant contributions from the following partners: City of Phoenix Homeland Defense Bureau (HDB), Maricopa County Department of Public Health (MCDPH), Maricopa County Department of Emergency Management (MCDEM), American Red Cross (ARC), The Arizona Partnership for Immunization (TAPI), Arizona State University (ASU), and the Arizona Hospital and Healthcare Association (AZHHA).

Local plans should focus on the role of managing and/or supporting reunification activities and that may supplement the Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) and/or Mass Care Annex. The template recognizes coordination is critical among the various organizations and agencies participating in reunification operations and identifies roles for those strategic partners. These organizations/agencies include: local, State, Tribal, and Federal agencies; non-government organizations (NGOs); National and State Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOADs) member organizations; faith-based and other voluntary organizations; and the private sector involved with reunification operations.

While this template is inclusive of the various agencies and organizations that support reunification activities, the local municipality drafting a reunification plan should identify their primary department(s) and/or a coordinating department or agency.

The use of this template and/or its contents shall be done in acknowledgement that the municipality shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City of Phoenix and all contributing organizations to the development of this template.

Introduction

General

This plan describes how the [Municipality] will address reunification services within the [Municipality] and reach out to external partners when [Municipality] resources are overwhelmed. For the purposes of this document, reunification services is defined as the process of assisting displaced disaster survivors to voluntarily re-establish contact with family, friends, and colleagues after a period of separation and providing facilitated assistance to children separated from their parent(s)/legal guardian(s). For incidents extending beyond the [Municipality] or a countywide response, the [Municipality] will function in a supporting role to the response in alignment with [County Emergency Management] plans.

Reunification Services is a mass care activity under the Emergency Support Function (ESF) #6 and supported by ESF #8: Public Health. It is one of many support functions established by the Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). ESF #6 provides coordination, collaboration, and resource identification for mass care/emergency assistance actions to support the local jurisdiction's capabilities to minimize the humanitarian impact of disasters and other emergencies. A reunification event will be managed under a Unified Command.

Reunification partners will respond with available resources in accordance with the requirements of their internal policies and in cooperation with emergency management officials. These agencies will respond as soon as a need is identified and often prior to the declaration, under their own authorities.

Under a Presidential declaration of major or emergency disaster and when conditions warrant, the State may request additional Federal support through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Region. This support may include technical assistance, activation of Federal resources and contracts, and coordination of national tools and resources when State and voluntary resources are insufficient to meet demand in disaster-impacted areas. Reunification support may be provided under the Stafford Act, as Amended, April 2013, Sections 774 and 775.

Purpose

The purpose of this reunification plan is to define the framework for County/State/Federal support of a coordinated, timely, and efficient reunification response in [Jurisdiction]. It also defines the full spectrum of services required from initiation until the recovery phase, when cases can be transitioned to local agencies. This multi-agency reunification services plan has been developed as an integrated strategy and process for implementing coordinated reunification operations at the jurisdictional level. The multi-agency reunification services plan will help to limit duplication of efforts and maximize use of available local, State, Tribal, and Federal governments; the private sector; and non-governmental resources.

Scope

This plan describes the coordination steps and implementation procedures necessary to ensure effective reunification activities within the [Municipality] to respond to the needs of the population affected by a disaster.

This plan also describes:

- Response capabilities and strategy of the multi-agency reunification services plan participants to implement reunification services and meet the needs of affected jurisdictions.
- Roles and responsibilities of the [Municipality] departments and outside supporting organizations/agencies participating in reunification operations for missing adults, separated families, and unaccompanied minors; disaster welfare inquiries; patients; foreign residents and visitors; household pets; and fatality management.
- Legal responsibilities, roles, and tasks of the various organizations/agencies participating in reunification operations.
- A holistic approach to reunification utilizing a multi-agency task force, which provides collaboration and coordination between participating agencies of the plan during a disaster.
- A breakdown of specific populations and related challenges and resources to consider in reunification plans.
- Methods for implementing reasonable accommodations that will allow individuals with disabilities, individuals with limited English proficiency, and those who do not speak English to access reunification services.
- Methods for scaling up operations and integration of State and national agencies/organizations into the response.
- The provision of support and crisis counseling for mental health, bereavement, grief, and other needs of disaster survivors suffering long-term separation or loss of loved ones.
- State and national tools and resources available to support reunification and a process to integrate them into operations.

Policies

The following policies and authorities are currently in place:

- All services will be provided without regard to economic status or racial, religious, political, ethnic, or other affiliation.
- The general population includes people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs.

Situation

The [Municipality] is vulnerable to the adverse effects of natural, technological, or other manmade disasters, which could result in loss of life, property damage, and social and economic disruption.

A major incident has occurred which requires reunification support to disaster survivors and their families. It will be either a notice or no-notice event and can be the result of a natural, man-made, or technological incident. The incident will disrupt communications and cause populations to disperse; incidents that occur during the work and/or school day and that may result in evacuations will separate families. Calls from many people outside the area seeking information on the status of loved ones will overwhelm local government, non-governmental organizations, and emergency dispatch centers.

Social media applications that survivors utilize to post status updates or obtain family contact information will be a reunification asset if they are accessible. Many groups may volunteer to assist by creating databases, websites, and message boards, which can result in duplicative efforts. This can create confusion for individuals looking for information about affected persons. When affected persons or those looking for such individuals do not have access to communications, cell phones, and other electronic equipment, especially in a catastrophic disaster, it may not be possible to use social media or these types of reunification tools.

Emergency responders will be affected by the incident as well, and will seek information about their families, in some cases before reporting for duty. The effects of separation, particularly for children, and the lack of information about family members will likely cause some level of psychological distress among many populations. This event may be located within one jurisdiction, may span multiple jurisdictions, or may encompass a very large (even national) geographic area if many survivors evacuate outside of the disaster area.

Initial tracking data will likely be collected in silos by entities such as emergency medical services, law enforcement personnel, county and State emergency management, public health officials, hospitals and other healthcare facilities, the medical examiner's/coroner's office, animal control, non-profit disaster relief organizations, and private sector organizations such as Google. Lack of interoperability among systems used for reunification (e.g., missing persons, unaccompanied minors, fatality management, patient

tracking, evacuation tracking, existing registries for people with disabilities, and lost/found household pets and service animals) will contribute to the complexity of tasks such as validating, reconciling, cross-referencing, and sharing data and will affect the type and scope of reunification services required to support operations.

Planned Events

Special events, such as large community or athletic events, marathons, and political gatherings, may warrant the implementation of the EOP and subsequently the Reunification Plan. These events, which bring large gatherings of people together have the potential to be impacted by natural or human-caused hazards.

Reunification services for such events may include a standby plan or a designated group taking an active presence to collect field inquiries. These events also may serve as a test for unplanned disasters, with the advantages of pre-planning and additional resources. This includes pre-staged resources, the advance availability of participant and emergency contact information, pre-identification of potential Community Assistance Center facilities, and early notification of and/or coordination with medical providers. The lead agency or the event organizer may have specific plans for reuniting unaccompanied minors with parents/legal guardians.

Planning Assumptions

The [Municipality] has identified the following conditions to have a significant impact on the success of the Reunification Plan:

- Prior to a disaster, State and local emergency management will have coordinated with the local/State/Federal agencies, voluntary organizations, and the private sector to understand and define respective reunification roles, responsibilities, capabilities, and capacity of their jurisdictions.
- Reunification services will be needed in some capacity on nearly every disaster incident. In small incidents, reunification needs may be easily met by the deployment of personnel from local NGOs, such as the American Red Cross.
- In larger or catastrophic incidents, reunification needs may exceed the resources and capability of any one agency or organization, requiring a combination of resources provided by Federal and State government, NGOs, and the private sector.
- Planning efforts include people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs, as well as agencies that provide services for children, older adults, and household pets and service animals have identified adequate accommodations and services required for the timely provision of reunification services.
- Agencies and organizations responsible for the temporary care of children (educational, child care, medical, foster care, juvenile justice, and recreational facilities), to include guardianship of children separated from parents or legal guardians as a result of disaster, and those overseeing reunification efforts have clearly identified roles and responsibilities.
- Schools, childcare providers, and residential facilities have established relationships and share emergency preparedness plans with first responders and/or local emergency managers in an effort to better coordinate overall reunification efforts in the event of a large scale or catastrophic incident.
- Prior to implementation of this plan, the jurisdiction is aware and knowledgeable of local and State laws relating to reunification. Individual privacy rights will be respected, and information will be safeguarded as required by applicable Federal and State laws.
- Protocols to share information among agencies/organizations providing reunification services have been developed through MOUs and routine use agreements; these will reduce duplicative efforts and contribute to a more accurate common operating picture.
- A streamlined process for survivor access to reunification systems, as well as coordinated public messaging about availability and accessibility of reunification services to survivors and their families, will lessen public confusion and result in more effective reunification outcomes.

- Reunification activities are dependent upon adequate communication and technology infrastructure.
- Public messages supporting reunification are thorough, timely, accurate, accessible, and compliant with all legal requirements for individuals with disabilities, individuals with limited English proficiency, those who do not speak English and others with access and functional needs.
- Reunification systems will be utilized at congregate and evacuation support sites throughout the disaster area and at host locations, including libraries and other Government and alternative installations as appropriate.
- Mass casualty and/or mass fatality incidents will require enhanced coordination among reunification operations, health care facilities, and fatality management services.
- An event necessitating the activation of a reunification plan may require transportation services to be provided to the public.
- Many ad hoc reunification systems may be created during large events by private sector entities and some individuals. These databases, social media sites, and message boards may not be interoperable and may result in duplicative efforts often leading to frustration for survivors.
- Support and crisis counseling for behavioral health, bereavement, grief, and other needs will be available for disaster survivors suffering long-term separation or loss of loved ones and for workers providing reunification services to survivors and their families.

Concept of Operations

General

The success of reunification operations is dependent upon:

- Survivor access to communications to include telephone, cellular phones, and/or internet to connect with email, social media, and reunification systems.
- Seamless coordination and the ability to share information among agencies and organizations with reunification responsibilities for evacuees, children, displaced adults, missing persons, emergency welfare inquiries, medical patients (to include those in facilities and those evacuated), fatalities, and household pets and service animals.
- Timely and consistent public messaging to survivors and the public outside the disaster area on available reunification mechanisms.

All emergencies and disasters begin and end locally, and initial response actions will be conducted by local jurisdictions and non-governmental organizations (NGOs). Locating missing children and reuniting unaccompanied minors with their parent/guardian is a priority of reunification operations. The most effective method to reunite children is to provide an efficient and coordinated family reunification program with a goal to deliver reunification services and support to all survivors and their families, friends, and colleagues.

Accounting for all missing persons, whether alive, injured, or deceased, will require effective communication and coordination among multiple agencies and organizations, each of which may have responsibility for a different component of reunification.

The American Red Cross and other NGOs that traditionally provide family reunification services in a disaster response in accordance with the requirements of their charters will coordinate and work with emergency management officials. NGOs, such as the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC), may provide services at the request of the local/state government. Local government officials provide guidance on the plan within their jurisdiction to these organizations.

A concerted effort is made to incorporate all agencies and organizations providing reunification services into the reunification plan and to identify ad hoc groups that may organize during a disaster to provide reunification services or tools and encourage them to participate in coordinated reunification operations. All agencies with a reunification responsibility are expected to participate in a collaborative manner.

Coordinating Reunification Systems

Operational decisions on the employment of family reunification systems are the responsibility and concern of the jurisdiction or NGO that own those assets. If State and/or Federal family reunification assets are employed, they are deployed in coordination and cooperation (at the State EOC) with the principal NGOs operating in the area.

In incidents where survivors are evacuated to other jurisdictions, coordination with those jurisdictions and/or Host States should include provision of communications equipment at evacuation sites for survivor use. Additionally, evacuee information collected through evacuation tracking systems and other mechanisms can be utilized by emergency management to aid reunification operations.

Information shared between multiple reunification and evacuation tracking systems will be subject to applicable local, State, and Federal privacy laws and data sharing agreements in place among participating agencies, organizations, and jurisdictions.

Community Assistance Center

During and immediately following an event requiring family reunification, the establishment of a Community Assistance Center is necessary to assist family members in providing information and locating their injured or deceased loved ones. Family assistance services must be easily accessible, well organized, and sensitive to the needs of the whole community.

Whether operated by the [Municipality] or County (or both), Community Assistance Centers within the [Municipality] will be located in a facility that is accessible to people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs. Processes and procedures which ensure accessibility during mass care and shelter operations, outlined in the Emergency Support Function (ESF) #6: Mass Care Annex, will apply during Community Assistance Center operations.

Organization and Assignment of Responsibilities

Primary Department(s)

[Fire Department]

The [Fire Department] serves as a **Primary Department** for reunification-related activities. [Fire Department] provides support to the coordination of reunification team members to develop and prioritize activities before, during, and after an emergency by doing the following:

- Provide and maintain a working relationship with support departments.
- Provide appropriate emergency medical services as identified in the Emergency Support Function (ESF) #4: Firefighting Annex, ESF #8: Public Health and Medical Services Annex, and ESF #9: Search and Rescue Annex.
- [Include any additional roles for local Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) as applicable.]

[Human Services Department]

The Human Services Department serves as a **Primary Department** for reunification-related activities. Human Services provides support to the coordination of reunification efforts to develop and prioritize activities before, during, and after an emergency by doing the following:

- Support the safety and needs of children separated from parents or legal guardians and parents or legal guardians seeking missing children during a disaster.
- Coordinate with the appropriate agencies and organizations for the temporary care and shelter of children. Confirm that background checks have been conducted and fingerprints collected for all individuals with access to unaccompanied minors.
- Coordinate with law enforcement and the judicial system to ascertain the legal responsibilities of various agencies to accomplish the following:
 - Provide temporary care of the minor.
 - Implement standardized guidance to verify the identity and custody rights of adults seeking the release of the child.
 - Safely release the child to a verified parent or legal guardian.
 - Work within the judicial system to ensure that proper legal procedures are followed and keep the safety of the child in mind at all times.
- Support human services roles and functions, including reunification, in disaster response and recovery operations in accordance with defined roles and emergency preparedness plans.

Organization and Assignment of Responsibilities

- Facilitate the sharing of information across jurisdictional lines allowing children and families access to the services and support to which they are entitled.

[Police Department]

The [Police Department] serves as a **Primary Department** for reunification-related activities. [Police Department] provides support to the coordination of reunification team members to develop and prioritize activities before, during, and after an emergency by doing the following:

- Provide and maintain a working relationship with support departments.
- Work with local or state child welfare agencies to ensure children are safe and have temporary and supportive care.
- Work with local child welfare agency to investigate the incident if a crime has potentially occurred.
- Complete appropriate paperwork required by local law enforcement agencies and/or local child welfare agencies.
- Coordinate with state law enforcement and NCMEC on reunification issues.
- Enter information on unaccompanied minors into the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) registry.
- [Include any additional roles for local Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) as applicable.]

Supporting Departments

[Communications Office]

The [Communications Office] serves as a **Supporting Department** for reunification-related activities. The [Communications Office] supports the Reunification Plan before, during, and after an emergency by doing the following:

- Provide timely and accessible public messages via appropriate channels as identified in the Emergency Support Function (ESF) #15: External Affairs Annex.

Organization and Assignment of Responsibilities

[Equal Opportunity Department]

The [Equal Opportunity Department] serves as a **Supporting Department** for reunification-related activities. [Equal Opportunity Department] supports the Reunification Plan before, during, and after an emergency by doing the following:

- Provide a Disability Access and Functional Needs (DAFN) Technical Specialist to the [Municipality] EOC to provide information and subject matter expertise to all EOC Sections on DAFN-related issues and available resources.
- Facilitate communication between the EOC and area organizations providing services to people with DAFN.
- Ensure people with DAFN are properly considered in all EOC operations and all aspects of the incident response and recovery, including public messaging.

[Office of Emergency Management]

[Office of Emergency Management] serves as a **Supporting Department** for reunification-related activities. [Office of Emergency Management] supports the Reunification Plan before, during, and after an emergency by doing the following:

- Activate the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and facilitate communication efforts within the [Municipality].
- Develop, maintain, coordinate, and execute all-hazards emergency preparedness plans that incorporate evacuation and reunification procedures and processes for children who have become separated from their parents or legal guardians as a result of disaster.
- Ensure evacuation and reunification procedures and processes be addressed in emergency preparedness plans and that plans be inclusive of all populations, to include children with and without disabilities and other access and functional needs.

[Parks and Recreation Department]

The Parks and Recreation Department serves as a **Supporting Department** for reunification-related activities. Parks and Recreation Department supports the Reunification Plan before, during, and after an emergency by doing the following:

- Assist with activating or opening pre-determined reunification sites.

Strategic Partners

[County Department of Emergency Management]

[County Department of Emergency Management] supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Serve as the main conduit for communications between the State and the [Municipality].
- Provide assistance with location determination for community assistance and reunification facilities as required.
- Collaborate and coordinate response with all pertinent agencies.
- Activate the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), as appropriate.
- Commence coordination of immediate county response and the movement of non-medical resources as appropriate.
- Support the public information needs of the [Office of the Medical Examiner].
- Request support for the operation of a Community Assistance Center, as and if needed.
- Support and facilitate for any needed ancillary operations and/or facilities (e.g., casualty collection facilities).

[County Department of Public Health]

[County Department of Public Health] supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Activate the [Public Health Department's Department Operations Center (DOC)] as appropriate.
- Assist in gathering information regarding patient status and data collection for reunification efforts.
- Manage and coordinate communications and information to healthcare, mortuary and other vested response partners.
- Monitor the public health situation if related to the event, taking actions as necessary.
- Expand to meet the needs of surge capacity related to vital records system and documentation.
- Manage federal department inquiries and coordination as they relate to public health issues and their associated fatalities (CDC, etc.).
- Commence coordination of immediate county response and movement of medical resources as appropriate.
- Serve as liaison to [County Office of the Medical Examiner].

[County Office of the Medical Examiner]

The [County Office of the Medical Examiner] is responsible for and in charge of decedent(s) and final disposition or release for [describe responsibilities regarding fatalities] in [County Name]. In a surge event, the [County Office of the Medical Examiner] will notify [County Department of Emergency Management] when resources are exceeded and discuss the need for Mass Fatality coordination.

OME supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Investigate fatalities that occur as a result of a disaster and provide assistance in the identification of deceased persons, including children.
- Direct the collection of ante mortem data through extensive communication with families and other means. Data collection may include the following:
 - Physical description of the victim (e.g., approximate age, height, weight, gender, hair color)
 - Description of clothing and jewelry
 - Description of unique characteristics (e.g., tattoos, scars, birthmarks)
 - Dental records, medical records, implant or joint replacement serial numbers, and fingerprint records
 - DNA reference samples from the family members.
- Establish death notification procedures in coordination with a team of mental health professionals and spiritual support providers.
- When a deceased child cannot be identified by name, enter information pertaining to the child (e.g., fingerprints, DNA, scars, marks, tattoos) into DOJ's National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs). NamUs is a national, centralized repository and resource center for missing persons and unidentified decedent records.

Arizona Division of Emergency and Military Affairs (DEMA)

Arizona Division of Emergency and Military Affairs (DEMA) supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Activate support functions within the State Emergency Response and Recovery Plan (SERRP) as appropriate.
- Activate the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) and/or Joint Information Center (JIC) as appropriate.
- Support regional response and coordinate between regions if event involves multiple counties.
- Coordinate requests for resources as processed by the counties, including any federal assets.

Organization and Assignment of Responsibilities

- Support the operation of a Community Assistance Center to assist individuals and families.

Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS)

Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Support regional response and coordinate between regions if event involves multiple counties.

Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI)

Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Support the response through Victim Assistance Program.
- Deploy Victim Assistance Rapid Deployment Teams as appropriate.

American Red Cross (ARC)

American Red Cross (ARC) supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Provide assistance as required for location determination.
- Activate the Safe & Well check-in application for self-reporting individuals to mark themselves “safe.”

Arizona Coalition for Healthcare Emergency Response (AzCHER)

Arizona Coalition for Healthcare Emergency Response (AzCHER) supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Enhance communication and information sharing between regional hospitals and vested response and recovery partners.

Regional Behavioral Health Authority: [RBHA Name]

[RBHA Name] supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Ensure, as the Regional Behavioral Health Authority (RHBA), access to high-quality behavioral health care for affected persons.

Regional Hospitals

Regional hospitals support reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Track patients using EM Track or another query system to identify missing persons.
- Ensure communication between other regional hospitals and vested response and recovery partners.
- Ensure patient-related information sharing between other regional hospitals and vested response and recovery partners.

The Arizona Partnership for Immunization (TAPI)

The Arizona Partnership for Immunization (TAPI) supports reunification for the [Municipality] by doing the following:

- Provide additional locations for Community Assistance Centers through partnerships as needed.
- Enhance communication and information sharing between regional hospitals and vested response and recovery partners.

Plan Development and Maintenance

Plan Review and Maintenance

The [Office of Emergency Management] will coordinate a review of the Reunification Plan annually and a major revision once every five years.

Major revisions are considered revisions which significantly alter or establish new policy. All major revisions to the plan will be approved by the [include process for plan review and maintenance].

New versions of the plan will be disseminated to all stakeholders. The plan has been determined to be a secure document and is only released to the public upon request and approval of [Office of Emergency Management], or authorized agent.

The plan, after being revised, will be made available to all Primary and Support departments for review and comment. The plan will also be submitted to the [County Department of Emergency Management] upon adoption by the [Local Governing Body, for example: City Council].

Event Critique and After-Action Reporting

This plan will be reviewed at least annually by [Office of Emergency Management]. Necessary updates will be published and disseminated immediately. After an exercise, drill, actual emergency, technological changes, or changes in departments, revisions affecting emergency response may be made to this plan.

An After-Action Report (AAR) must be completed after a formally declared emergency. The [Municipality's] [Office of Emergency Management] will coordinate the inclusion of any AAR action items into the plan.

This plan will be reviewed annually in its entirety for any needed updates, revisions, or additions. It is the responsibility of [Office of Emergency Management] to provide any necessary updates and to ensure the annex is published and disseminated appropriately.

Authorities and References
