Letter from the Chair

Over the past year, our work has concentrated on addressing gaps in the community that could impair progress in disaster preparedness.

Much of the focus has been on supporting the efforts of the Mass Casualty Tracking and Reunification Arizona Collaborative (MCTRAC), which is building capacities to address mass casualty incidents. MCTRAC was inspired by a Targeted Event Readiness Forum (TERF, trademarked by Coyote Crisis Collaborative) requested by the Tempe Emergency Manager as well as Sky Harbor Airport. During the event, Tempe's Assistant Fire Chief realized victim tracking could begin with phone images and populated with first responders trained to rapidly add characteristics. The launch of this project provides support for hospital surges, evacuation, law enforcement perimeter security, medical examiner force multipliers, and more. As MCTRAC's executives advance to state and tribal applications and customizations, the future of mass casualty response will see a paradigm shift. Coyote Crisis Collaborative is honored to support the efforts.

Through Significant Event Readiness Forums (SERFs) and TERFs, the state and its regions have identified new roadmaps to improved disaster planning with new partners. At the direction of the Arizona Department of Health Services' Bureau of Public Health Emergency Preparedness (ADHS PHEP), Coyote Crisis Collaborative must ascertain progress made on recommendations. Advancements made as a result of the events are substantial and emphasize the need for a less threatening environment than exercises to foster candid discussions.

On behalf of the board of directors, thank you to our stakeholders for helping us delineate and prioritize initiatives. Our sincere appreciation is also extended to ADHS PHEP for sponsorship and guidance. Finally, many thanks to the board of directors for providing direction and accountability.



Civilian-Military Mass Casualty Incident Response

Targeted Event Readiness Forum (TERF)

The TERF was held on March 13, 2023, at Desert Willow Conference Center. A total of 78 individuals attended to explore civilian and military capacities to address three scenarios:

- 1) an urban-wildland interface fire at Camp Navajo near Flagstaff,
- 2) a 6.7 magnitude earthquake in the Algodones fault near the Yuma Marine Corps Air Station, and
- **3)** an intentional bombing of the State Farm Stadium in Glendale on a Sunday during a Cardinals home game.

Among the findings were the need to identify processes for activation and any potential for expediting pre-placements/staging, establish methods of communication, create cross-training, and exercise together. The Collaborative is already working with Pima County and Davis Monthan Air Force Base on another SERF to build upon results.

Significant Event Readiness Forum (SERF)

The SERF was held on June 19, 2023, at the Prescott Resort and Conference Center. A total of 77 individuals attended the SERF to consider the chaotic scene following a shooting during an outdoor event in Prescott Valley.

Suggestions resulting included integration of an air branch into operations (MCTRAC has established an Air Operations Subcommittee to work on this project, which will include the military capacities and a mutual aid agreement among air ambulance companies), prioritization of first responder vehicle release from active scenes, reassessment of staff recall capacities and use of supplemental staffing strategies, work on Family Reunification Centers (already in process).

Significant Event Readiness Forum (SERF)

The SERF was held on November 16, 2023, at the Northern Arizona University Conference Center with 86 participants. The scenario involved a BNSF train - carrying alcohol and Potassium Hydroxide, dry freight, and rocks - colliding with a vehicle, sending rail cars into the Visitor's Bureau and AMTRAK station, and spilling hazardous chemicals into the water system as well as the Rio de Flag.

Among the findings were the need to create a municipal/county/ tribal Business Operations Center (BOC) that can garner support from others who can serve as force multipliers for first responders, supplemental surgical and other space (tents) for Flagstaff Medical Center, reconvening meetings of PIOs and liaisons, and Family Reunification Centers to accommodate victim families prior to activation of the Community Assistance Center. Already, the public health "lead" for Coconino County serves on the state FRC committee convened by the Collaborative. Furthermore, MCTRAC intends to work with the region on support for the hospital.



School Access and Functional Needs/ Complex Medical Needs

Targeted Event Readiness Forum (TERF)

As the result of meetings convened by the Arizona Statewide Independent Living Council (AZSILC), the Collaborative launched a TERF to contemplate two scenarios: an explosion at a school causing the need for evacuation and a shooting requiring an extended lockdown. The TERF was held on June 5, 2023, at Desert Willow Conference Center with 134 individuals attending.

The outcomes were extensive and were addressed by the TERF planning committee, which was reconvened to focus upon

- a) Senate Bill 1315 (pertaining to providing assistance to students with disabilities in emergency response planning) and
- **b)** defining solutions to issues raised during the TERF at the request of the Arizona Department of Education (ADE) and the Arizona Department of Emergency and Military Affairs' Division of Emergency Management.

The TERF planning committee completed all tasks in November. ADE will be releasing new guidance and the TRUST will be training schools on implementation strategies as a consequence.

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
